This month's CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE...

The National Farmers Union says quad bikes are one of the most common one item's stolen in the rural community. They are portable, with little or no security.

The below can assist you to protect your quad bike.

1. Secure and immobilise the vehicle when not in use.
2. Consider fitting an immobiliser to the vehicle such as intelligent band www.intelligentband.co.uk and a tracker device.
3. Lock them in secure buildings and consider using ground anchor plates and chains for extra security.
4. Avoid leaving machines in open view when not in use.
5. There are a number of marking kits on the market making your vehicle very identifiable and therefore less desirable to a thief. If the quad is stolen should it be recovered it can be returned to you.
6. Use the National property register www.immobilise.com to register all your property. (See the immobilise factsheet)
